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LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL



I am very pleased to introduce this autumn issue of 'The Simmarian'. As I write we are looking forward to welcoming to Strawberry Hill the next generation of Simmarians. Last year with almost 2500 undergraduates we had the largest student population in the history of the college and while numbers grow and the range of subjects increases the staff work hard to maintain the spirit of community that lies at the heart of St Mary's.

In the course of this summer work started on a new building to house a Centre for Excellence in Initial Teacher Training. The project which is now around £3.6 million in scale will be the largest in cash terms in the history of the college and is supported by a grant from the Higher Education Funding Council. When completed it will provide fine modern facilities for all aspects of teacher training at the college.

This autumn we look forward to the appointment of a new Chairman of Governors following the appointment of Bishop Patrick O'Donoghue as Bishop of Lancaster. Bishop O'Donoghue developed a great interest in and affection for St Mary's in his time as Chairman of Governors and he has of course moved to a part of the country where historically there are strong Simmarian connections.

Over the course of the year I have the opportunity to meet former students from the North and South of the country and from further afield. It is always a great pleasure when this happens because of the esteem in which so many former students hold St Mary's and the inspiration this gives to those of us who serve the college today.

Historic Lantern Restored to Strawberry Hill House

A replica of a lantern owned by Horace Walpole has been hung in the entrance hall of Walpole House. The original lantern was designed by Richard Bentley in 1753 and has been recreated by metal and glass craftsmen in England and America. The three-year project was partially financed by the Walpole House Guides and by the 'Friends of Strawberry Hill'.

The 'Friends' was established to promote, support and improve one of the earliest and most influential houses built in the eighteenth century gothic revival style. 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Strawberry Hill Overseas Concern ~ (SHOC)

Kevin Cook writes: SHOC is a charity whose major concern is to forge links with Simmarians working in what we call the 'third world'. SHOC was founded in 1970 and since then has raised over £100,000 for nearly 100 projects around the world. Last year SHOC was the college's entry in the prestigious Queen's Prize competition and, whilst it did not get through to the final judging, our entry was highly commended.

The major achievement of the past twelve months has been to reach the £16,000 target we set ourselves to support the work of a past student, Sister Mary Ann Katiti (1996-98), now headmistress of Angelina Tembo School at Kabwe in Zambia. A total of £16,725 has been raised over the past 2-3 years through the efforts of the Chaplain, the college and local community, and SHOC. The largest single donation was the £5336.39 received from Coventry Catholic schools who raised the money as a part of their Millennium Celebrations. We are most grateful to Simmarian D.C. Daly, headmaster of St Peter and Paul Catholic Primary school for organising this collection. The money collected has helped Sister Mary Ann rebuild her school. Currently we have a student taking a year out from her studies to teach at the school and we hope to continue to support Sister Mary Ann in this way.

SHOC has contacted Joachim and has asked him to cost a major project that would benefit his school.

Michelle Rodrigues - Conference Manager at St Mary's College

Michelle Rodrigues studied English and Classics at St Mary's from 1991-93. Michelle read for an MA in Heritage Interpretation after completing her undergraduate degree. Why did you choose St Mary's as a place to study?

Initially I chose the college as a friend from school recommended it and a number of girls from Hyton had come previously. I came to see the college and was impressed with the beautiful grounds and welcoming atmosphere. I love the old house and grounds, and they continue to be one of the reasons why I have stayed here as a member of staff.

What were your initial impressions of college as a student?

I had a sense of a small and friendly community. Students from different year groups all knew one another and I felt immediately welcome. I made many friends and am still in touch with so many people.

So you were fully involved in the social life of the college?

Yes, particularly as I worked in the bar from Freshers week until I started to manage it part time. It was a very good way to meet lots of people from different courses and years. I have fond memories of the balls and of the various locations of the SU bar after it burned down at the end of my first year. We had discos in C1 (the old chapel) and drinks in what is now the studio theatre.

What are your memories of the staff while you were a student?

Everyone encouraged you and help was always available whenever you needed it. Students'

work was closely monitored and that encouraged people to do their best.

What was it like to work with members of staff after having studied here?

It was a little strange at first but a very positive experience. As I had worked in the Conference Office during holidays and in the bar I had already developed a professional relationship with many people. It was different working with academics after having been taught by them but I was immediately accepted as a member of staff.

You started as the Careers Officer here?

Yes, I worked in the Careers Office for a year and also worked part time in the Conference Office. I enjoyed working in the Careers Office as it was nice to work with students. I was involved in graduate fairs and teaching fairs which gave me further experience in conferencing. I also enjoyed organising days with prospective employers such as the Army and the RAF.

What do you enjoy about your work as the Conference Officer?

I love organising weddings and contributing to one of the most important days of someone's life. I particularly enjoy working on the weddings of former students and as the years go by I have seen many people return here for their weddings. I like working with the public and if a conference goes well I get a real sense of achievement. I also enjoy working on parties and special events and we have hosted parties for Mick Jagger and for Bob Geldof. We frequently work on events for television and sporting celebrities. The college is used for filming and recently we have had crews from 'Jonathon Creek' and 'The Mrs Bradley Murder Mysteries'.

Sports Report- Sustaining output

Once again the academic year provided us with many sporting achievements to celebrate.

In athletics we again reinforced our reputation as serious competitors. At the BUSA indoor meeting Bianca Liston won gold in the sprint hurdles, as did Rob Paul in the high jump. Bianca followed this up with a bronze at the AAA Championship. At the BUSA track and field outdoors Andrew Frost (hammer) and Rob Paul (high jump) took gold. A number of impressive efforts saw the club finish fifth overall in the men's team competition. Following their wins both Andrew and Rob represented BUSA in their events at the 'uk: athletics' Aqua-Pura International at Loughborough University. Andrew Frost also made a number of appearances in a British vest at Under 23.

The track and field squad had two other very successful appearances during the year. At the Kinnard-Sword trophy meet at Kingsmeadow track the men's field events team came away with the Sword Prize with those competing on the track finishing a close second in the Kinnard competition. Ten days after the BUSA Outdoors Athletics Championship, St Mary's had its finest victory in recent years at Bath. In a three-way competition between Team Bath, University of Wales Institute Cardiff and St Mary's, an exemplary team performance saw St Mary's win all three competitions outright. Strength in depth was the order of the day with notable performances from several members who doubled up in events in which they would not usually take part. Our hammer throwers competed in the high jump and the 1500m to ensure maximum points.

The Ladies cross-country squad retained the London Colleges League Championships and the men slipped to fifth overall. This was in part because we were unable always to field a full team. In addition the club entered a men and women's team in the Hyde Park Relays with a number of credible performances in a very strong field.

The women's hockey & men's rugby sides showed early promise in their respective BUSA league competitions. The hockey team faltered slightly but easily qualified in third position. The rugby team managed to repeat the previous year's achievements winning the Premiership for record second year in succession.

The knockout stages of the respective cup competitions started in February. Both sides have enjoyed considerable success in recent years

so had high expectations within the competition. Despite some narrow victories and fragile performances both teams managed to progress to the semi-final stages. Then on what can only be described as a sombre Wednesday, Exeter University eliminated both Simms teams. As both sides had defeated Exeter in the league stages of the competition, the sharp exit from the cup could only be described as a dreadful case of underachievement by college sides that were capable of lifting the trophy.

Ladies Gaelic Football once again proved to be too strong for the other British Universities winning the championship in Middlesborough. This allowed qualification for the All Ireland tournament but unfortunately they did not get to participate due to the foot and mouth outbreak.

The final great success story was the continued success of the cricketing fraternity. The men's sides elevation into the Premiership for the first time caused some anxious moments for coach Andy Reid-Smith. However, with good winter training the side proved to be in good

form and was unfortunate not to progress to the knockout stages of BUSA. The Simms team finished joint second in the group but failed to qualify after being beaten by the Oxford side. The fact that the weather prevented Simms playing Cardiff, the group's weakest side, deprived us of the points needed to qualify outright.

Another high point of the cricket season was the two annual invitation games against the MCC and Lashings that were played at our Teddington Lock site. The MCC game was a closely fought affair with Simms coming home narrow winners. The Lashings game boasted a truly world class opposition that included Brian Lara, Junior Murray, Jimmy Adams, Stuart Williams and Richie Richardson.

A number of St Mary's students have achieved some notable representative honours over the past academic year. Tim Murtagh represented British Universities v Pakistan where he took five Wickets. He has played a number of games for Surrey this year as well as representing the college. Stephen Price, Andrew Mawson achieved international recognition playing for England Universities and Andrew was given the extra honour of captaining the side. Other notable St Mary's performers this year are shown in this table.

Did You Know?

The college theatre, built in the 1960's, was of a revolutionary design. It influenced many other theatres including the National Theatre Cottesloe auditorium. The theatre was built in the round and was the work of the former Head of Drama, Colette King.

Some of the country's top athletes, including the England rugby team and the London Broncos, have used the sporting facilities at Strawberry Hill for training. The college is also regularly used by many international athletes and Olympic champions for assessment, monitoring and training.

In the 1880's, the morning bell rang at 6.30 am and lights went out at 10.00 pm. Students had under three hours recreation time each day and had a homework period each night from 8.00 pm until 9.30 pm.

The changing face of St Mary's - New Study Opportunities

Marion Lowe, Registrar, writes: The college has been changing rapidly over the last few years, expanding and providing new opportunities for students. Last year, the college took more students than ever before. This article sets out the changes and the much wider study opportunities available to a new generation of Simmarians.

Teacher training: the heart of the college mission

Many know St Mary's as a predominantly teacher training college. Teacher training still remains at the heart of the college's mission and nearly a third of our students are training as much needed teachers. In Secondary PGCE we offer around 100 places in several subjects as well as an undergraduate PE programme. Opportunities in Primary have been changing with the recent introduction of a part-time PGCE available over eighteen months as well as an expanded full-time programme. There is also a new three year Primary Initial Teacher Training Degree (which is especially suitable for mature students) which runs alongside the traditional four year programme.

In addition to the opportunities available for teacher training at the college itself, we are also involved in a School-based PGCE programme in conjunction with the Portsmouth Diocese and its Catholic primary schools. This programme is based at the Holy Family Primary School in Southampton. This is an exciting development for the college providing teachers for Catholic schools across a much wider area.

New undergraduate subjects

Although the college has offered flexible BA/BSc programmes for many years, the college now offers a much broader range of subjects including new innovative programmes which respond to the changing pattern of student applications often for more vocationally orientated degrees. In 1998 the college introduced half degrees in Health and Human Biology, Management Studies and Media Arts and all these programmes saw their first graduates this year. In introducing new programmes such as these, we try to ensure that they will provide students with skills for the workplace. With the Management Programme,

in line with the college's mission, there is a strong ethical dimension to the studies. Media Arts places an emphasis on practical skills such as video and radio production as well as theoretical studies into the effects of the media on our society.

Education and Employment was a new degree programme introduced in September 2000. This has grown out of the successful Education Studies programme and includes the study of education in a wide number of contexts such as the workplace. In September 2001 the college will see its first Psychology students for some years.

Next year we hope to have students on our new Third World Studies programme which will allow students to study development issues with opportunities for field work in Africa, another programme closely related to our mission. We will also be introducing a half degree programme in Health, Lifestyle and Nutrition. This will allow students to study such issues as the effects of stress on health and the diet and lifestyle required to remain healthy. A further programme for 2002 entry is in Professional and Creative Writing which will provide students with writing skills in a range of different contexts from creative writing, journalism and academic publishing.

Postgraduate and other opportunities

As well as new undergraduate programmes, the college is introducing new masters programmes. From September we will be collaborating with local education authorities to offer a new MA in Continuing Professional Development for newly qualified teachers. The programme in Applied Human Science has also been successfully re-validated and renamed the MSc in Health, Nutrition and Physical Activity and is designed especially for exercise and health professionals. Although the Department of Theology and Religious Studies no longer offers the MA in Theology and Religious Studies, from February we hope to offer masters programmes in Chaplaincy and Pastoral studies which will be for those working or intending to work in these areas.

In addition to masters students, we have a growing number of research students who are studying for PhD with established researchers in History, Sociology, Theology, English and Sport Science

We aim, in these days of mass higher education, to offer a student-centred education where students are valued as individuals whatever their background.

We have an exciting range of programmes and excellent support services, not to mention a very good graduate employment record (in a recent national league table of all 147 university and colleges, St Mary's was ranked 29th well above many established 'old' universities.)

The last issue of the Simmarian, highlighted the Educational Liaison team and what they are doing to spread the message about what the college has to offer. However you can help too as it has been shown that recommendation is a very important way of student finding out about the college. If you know anyone considering a degree, PGCE or Masters, you could recommend St Mary's and thereby continue the college's traditions.

Dr David Balhatchet, died after a short illness on April 22nd, 2001 aged 74. Dr Balhatchet joined the staff of St Mary's in 1951 and was appointed Head of French in 1975. He took early retirement in 1983 after 32 year of dedicated service and went on to gain a D Phil from Oxford in 1988. He was awarded a distinction by the Cornish Language Board and installed as a Bard in 1992. Tony Holland (1953-55) recalled David's sense of humour, his gentleness, his loyalty, his willingness to help and his unflinching kindness and concern. Tony recalls David's 'strong, unswayable and courageous adherence to his beliefs and values which, allied to his generous kindness, made of this decent man ... a kind of hero.' In a second warm tribute, Peter Hailey (1959-61) comments that David was, and remains, warmly understanding and strongly supportive. Peter comments, 'My use of the present tense is intentional. I am very aware that his faith and humanity lives on - an ongoing source of reassurance and strength.'

Jackie Coughlan, Secretary to the Principal from until 2000, died in July 2001. Jackie was appointed during Fr Desmond Beirne's principalship and worked with Dr Naylor from his appointment in 1992 until her retirement. She died after a long and brave struggle against cancer. Dr Naylor writes: "Jackie Coughlan had friends as much as colleagues at St Mary's. I will always be grateful for the support and kindness she gave to me in the years we worked together. May she rest in peace."
