MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

As I completed my first year in post as Principal on 30th September 2011, it was heartening to see the progress we have made in strengthening our relationships with you, our alumni, and in bringing you more fully into the St Mary's family. In this we have been greatly helped by the work that was done by Director of Alumni Relations and Development Martin Thornton, and by our intern Lydia Smith. Both members of staff have now reached the end of their fixed-term contracts; I would like to thank them for their contribution to the Alumni Office, and wish them the best of luck in their future pursuits.

This has been a tremendously exciting year for St Mary's, as we have achieved top results from the Quality Assurance Agency (QAA) and Ofsted for our teaching, and navigated a careful course through the choppy and changing waters of UK Higher Education, especially with the major increase in fees that undergraduate students will have to pay from September 2012 onwards. We have set a fee level at £8,000 which represents the cost to us under the new system; we have chosen not to use the introduction of higher fees to make a windfall profit from our students, 25% of whom come from families that earn less than £15,000 per annum. Nevertheless, we will greatly improve the level of service we provide to our students by being more efficient in our operations and by building up other income streams.

We approach the coming years under this new funding system with great confidence, based on our trust in the distinctive and highly valuable education we offer our students. Our mission is to help prepare students for flourishing lives and successful careers through excellent, research-based teaching in a community of trust and respect built on our Catholic ethos and

identity. We are aiming for the complete development of the human person – intellectually, spiritually and physically – as symbolised on our campus by the close proximity (which you will recall) of library, chapel and running track. The physical dimension, especially our strong interest in sport, is vitally important to this mission and will be fostered by the opening of our new £8.5 million sports building. We are also now working actively to improve the look and amenity of the campus and we are very close to achieving university title.

While our fundamentals are sound and we are on an upwards course, much remains to be done. We hope that you, our alumni, will be strongly behind us as we move forward, remembering your own happy times at St Mary's and eager to see new generations of students enjoy that same unique type of higher education that you yourselves have enjoyed.

Alumni Inducted into Hall of Fame



At the opening of St Mary's new £8.5 million sports facilities (see previous page), the University College unveiled its Hall of Fame for Sport, which recognises outstanding individuals at the highest levels of sport. St Mary's alumni Dave Bedford and Rebecca Romero MBE were the first two sports people to be inducted.

Bedford is a former 10,000m world record holder and is now Director for the Virgin London Marathon, which is a partner in St Mary's highly successful Endurance Performance and Coaching Centre (EPACC), for many years the home of 2012 Olympic hopeful Mo Farah.

Double Olympic medallist Romero secured Silver in quadruple sculls in Athens 2004 and a cycling Gold in the individual pursuit in Beijing 2008, and recently announced her retirement from Olympic competition.

Student Travel Bursaries Funded By Alumnus

Former student Peter Daley generously donated \$7,000 to St Mary's earlier this year for travel bursaries that have allowed seven students to study for a semester abroad. Peter said: "I am passionate about supporting student travel so that the next generation can enjoy the opportunities I received by travelling."

Peter trained as a teacher at St Mary's between 1959-1962. At the time of graduating there were very few opportunities to teach in the UK so he decided to emigrate to the United States. During the 1960s people were required to be US nationals in order to teach, something he had not realised until arriving in America. He applied to a recruitment agency to find a job and, after numerous fruitless attempts to place him, the agency finally hired him to work on commission for them. After working there for two

years he spotted an opportunity to become a runner with a Wall Street firm. He landed the job just as the NASDAQ market was starting in 1971; none of the seasoned traders wanted anything to do with the world's first electronic stock exchange, so they left it to unseasoned traders and runners to look after. Luckily NASDAQ boomed and anyone who was involved from the start was well positioned. In 1972 President Nixon floated the US dollar, which created the foreign exchange market as we know it, and as one of the few foreigners working at the bank Peter was put in charge of the foreign exchange desk – mainly by being in the right place at the right time.

He was involved in the foreign exchange markets from their inception, purchasing a seat of the New York Mercantile Exchange along the way and retiring in 1995. After trying retirement for a couple of years he founded his own bank, which opened for business in 2000. Peter is now fully retired, although he still has an interest in the bank. He now enjoys spending his time between his house in New Jersey and his beach house in Long Beach Island. Peter also supports Sage Eldercare, local theatre, enjoys racing his sail boat and has generously supported Ratcliffe College, his former school.

Student Benefits From Donation

Rushil Sawhney (far right) is just one of the students fortunate enough to have benefitted from Peter Daley's generosity: he is studying for one semester at the University of San Francisco. Having migrated across the pond in August Rushil describes his experience so far:

Rushil said of the opportunity, "San Francisco is amazing ... and more! Throughout my time here I have been constantly learning and benefiting from



this experience – I don't only mean academically, but also learning about myself, my culture, the culture around me, and about San Francisco. In the seven weeks I've been here, I feel like I've gained more than the whole of last year put together. I feel that's the benefit of studying abroad.

"I've had opportunities here that I feel are rare to come by in England. For example, I'm enrolled in a Public Speaking class – although many such courses are offered in England, constantly studying and practising speaking in public, twice a week, over eighteen weeks is actually uncommon. This is just one example of something I'm genuinely benefiting from."

Martin Thornton, Director of Alumni Relations and Development, commented, "We would like to thank Peter for his very generous donation to help St Mary's students travel. Last month we held a Thanksgiving dinner for the benefit of American students studying here, and it was great to be able to welcome him as one of our guests. I am also pleased to announce that Peter has graciously accepted the role as St Mary's Alumni and Fundraising ambassador for North America."
