Honorary Fellows

Three leading academics, one of whom is a former student of St Mary's, a distinguished journalist and a prominent local man were the recipients of Honorary Fellowships from St Mary's on January 22. Honorary Fellowships are



conferred on people eminent in their chosen field or on those who have made an outstanding contribution to society.

The new Fellows are Professor George Brown, Professor Charles Handy, Mr Clifford Longley, Rev Professor Jack Mahoney SJ and Mr Mike Phelps. They were presented to the Chairman of the Board of Governors, Rt. Rev Patrick O'Donoghue.

Professor Brown, a prominent educational psychologist, is a former student of St Mary's (1956-8). Professor Handy is a writer and broadcaster and a former professor of the London Business School. The distinguished journalist, Clifford Longley currently writes for **The Telegraph** and **The Tablet**. The Rev Professor Mahoney SJ, a prolific author of publications on business ethics, is a former professor at the London Business School. The Simmarians from Malta

Joseph Zammit Mangion writes: The link of students from the Island of Malta with Simmaries goes back as far as 1881. In 1880, the then Colonial Government of Malta took the decision to start training primary school head teachers in the UK and the first male teachers selected were sent to St Mary's. The female teachers were sent to other Catholic teacher training colleges. Over 150 Maltese teachers were trained at the college until 1971 so one can see what great influence the training given at St Mary's had on Maltese education as a whole and the training of individual teachers in particular.

Most of the Maltese head teachers trained at St Mary's reached posts of high position in education in Malta. Perhaps the best known Maltese Simmarian is Mr Francis Ebejer, the writer of many Maltese and English novels, plays and broadcasts. Born in 1925, he trained at St Mary's in the years 1948-1950. He is undoubtedly the foremost modern writer of Maltese, he was equally well versed in the English language and produced a number of novels and short stories written in English. Francis Ebejer died on June 10, 1993 and a monument has been erected in his memory in Dingli.

Liverpool Simmarian Club
