

LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL



I am very pleased to introduce this latest edition of The Simmarian and to take the opportunity to draw your attention to some campus developments of great significance to the college.

Firstly, the historic building at Strawberry Hill is being featured this summer on the *Restoration* programme on BBC2. Viewers are able to vote for one building

to be restored to its former glory with the help of funding raised through the programme. It would be marvellous if Strawberry Hill were to win this contest with the help of votes from students past and present so if we are still in the running by the time you receive this magazine, do please vote for Strawberry Hill!

The historic buildings are instantly identifiable with the College but are no longer suitable for the learning and teaching needs of students and staff. The *Restoration* programme presents a great opportunity to make the building much more widely known.

Secondly, the completion of the new running track is scheduled for late summer, work having started in early May. We hope to hold the opening ceremony later this year.

Thirdly, planning permission was granted by the London Borough of Richmond upon Thames for new student accommodation to be developed alongside the current Graham, Wiseman and Doyle halls of residence, in effect establishing a small student village in that corner of the campus. The project, which is around £7 million, is due to start this summer for completion in time for the 2005-06 academic year.

The purpose of these developments, which over four years will have exceeded $\pounds 10$ million, is the general improvement of the campus facilities for students and staff.



- Walpole named the house after consulting old deeds, which called the site Strawberry Hill Shot.
- The original house on the site had been occupied by a coachman, an actor and a bishop.
- Walpole was a keen collector of curios which included a vulcanised date from the evacuations at Herculaneum and Cardinal Wolsey's hat.
- The house has the world's finest collection of 16th and 17th Flemish stained glass.
- The area beneath the Long Gallery was originally a cloister which was later converted into rooms.
- The auction of Walpole's possessions after his death lasted twenty-four days.
- In Lady Waldegrave's time, the house became the chief meeting place for liberal party leaders.
- When St Mary's College moved to the house in 1925, the Waldegrave Ballroom was temporarily used as a chapel, Walpole's library became a study hall and the former stables were converted into laboratories.


Creative Writers Win Awards

In October 2003, the Professional and Creative Writing Programme at St Mary's awarded the Strawberry Hill Gothic Prize for Creative Writing.

At this event there were poetry readings by two members of St Mary's staff, Robyn Bolam and Conor Carville, and a reading of a new story by Richard Mills. The college's Royal Literary Fund Fellow, Brian

Keaney, read the first chapter of his latest novel.

The special guest was novelist, Michael Mail, who won the Scotland on Sunday Short Story Prize in 1999 and who has just published his second novel, Exposure. The first prize of 150 guineas was awarded to Martyn Jones and Jane Scott-Bromley and Carolyn Veldmeijer were awarded joint second prizes. Over



fifty students from the Professional and Creative Writing Programme attended the event.

A selection of work by staff and students of the Programme is on the college website and the Programme will shortly publish a CD-ROM of students' short stories entitled '200 years on: New Writing.'

Tablet Archives at College

In September the Tablet Publishing Company signed an



agreement with the School of Theology, Philosophy and History to place its archives of *The Tablet* and *Priests and People* on long-term loan with the School. *The Tablet* archives, which date from 1840, will be managed by the School, which

plans to digitise the collection to enable approved users to search, identify and access articles and reports.

Forty years ago a new college bar was opened in the old chapel. Keg beers were two shillings per pint (10p) and bottled beers between one shilling (5p) to one and seven (around 8p). Two months after its opening, the Weekly Record reported that there was a vast amount of litter 'strewn around in gay profusion' and noted the 'gloomy atmosphere' and lack of meat pies. In March 1965, littering and glass theft became such a problem that the bar was temporarily closed.

The Hogan Lecture Halls were furnished through a bequest to the college from the estate of Margaret Hogan, the first female Vice-Principal of St Mary's College, who was appointed in 1965 in preparation for the arrival of the first 160 women students who joined the college in 1966. The Many Strawberry Hills

There may be only one Strawberry Hill for Simmarians but there are a surprising number of Strawberry Hills throughout the world.

Strawberry Hill in Virginia is home to the Strawberry Hill racecourse and the Strawberry Hill motor cross raceway is in South Carolina. Vancouver's Strawberry Hill is a town in the Surrey district and



Strawberry Hill in Cambridge Massachusetts is an area

of residential housing designed around woodland and ponds. San Francisco's Strawberry Hill is one of forty-three hills around the city. Strawberry Hill in Kansas is a 1920's residential and shopping area.

There is a Strawberry Hill holiday cabin resort in Arizona, a Strawberry Hill spa resort in Jamaica, a Strawberry Hill holiday estate in Newfoundland and a Strawberry Hill Persian cattery in Bredene near Ostend. Strawberry Hill in Queensbury, New York was artificially created as a ski slope and removed in the 1960's. Closer to home, there is a Strawberry Hill pond at an Iron Age hill fort in Epping Forest.

2003/2004 has been an excellent season for the St Mary's athletics squad, and the results are some of the best they have ever achieved. At the BUSA Cross-Country Championships the women's and men's teams finished 2nd and 4th respectively, with Faye Fullerton finishing 3rd in the long race. Kate Reed's outstanding results from last year have continued and at the Indoor Championships she broke the existing 3000m record in a time of 9.18. The Outdoor Championships saw a number of fine performances in track and field events with eight individual medal winners. Events were won by Stephen Murphy (3000m steeplechase), Jade Wright (5000m), Claire Smithson (discus) and Kate Reed (10000m) who smashed the previous record by fifty-six seconds. The UK Athletics High Performance Endurance Centre, based at St Mary's, has again provided further evidence that this programme is capable of producing high class performers. Kate Reed has been selected as a travelling reserve for the European Cup held in June and is in the team with Paula Radcliffe and Jo Pavey.

The men's 1st XV rugby union side won the Premier South League gaining notable wins against UWIC, Bath, Bristol, Exeter and UW Swansea. In the Championship the team beat St Mark and St John 42-0 and Newcastle 38-16, taking them to a semi-final against Durham. Unfortunately, despite all their efforts the side lost 21-28 and Durham progressed to beat Exeter in the final. The men's 2nd XV repeated last year's success by winning the South Eastern Trophy 1A; they lost 40-22 to Loughborough in the Trophy semifinals. The 3rd XV also won their league, the South Eastern Trophy 3A, winning all games played and amassing 392 points whilst only conceding 11! The contribution of Mark Williams was first-class and consequently he was selected to play for English Universities.

The St Mary's Gaelic teams had yet another excellent season. The men's team retained the British Universities Gaelic football Championship by beating Liverpool Hope 0-10 to 1-8, scoring a free to secure a win in the last minute of the game. In the Trench Cup final the men's side played against IT Tallaght, the Dublin College, and after going to extra-time eventually achieved a momentous victory 1-9 to 1-8. The women's team won the British Championship, also retaining the title that they had won in the previous year, by defeating Liverpool Hope 2-4 to 1-6.

In their first season in the Premier South League the women's football 1st XI came a creditable 3rd, winning five of their ten games and drawing two others. This league position saw them qualify for the Championship, beating Leeds 4-3 but being defeated by Bath 3-1 at the quarter-finals stage. The men's football club had a truly outstanding season with the 1st XI, 2nd XI and 4th XI winning league titles. The 1st XI won eight of their twelve games, drawing three

others, with a positive goal difference of nineteen. In the Premier League South play-off against Southampton, the score was 2-2 at full-time but regrettably after extra-time the final score was 2-3. The 1st XI qualified for the Championship but lost 3-0 to Bath in the last 16. The 2nd XI won the South Eastern Trophy 1A winning all ten games, scoring thirty-one goals and only conceding six! Bath again proved to be difficult opposition beating the 2nd XI 3-0 on penalties at the quarter-finals stage of the Trophy. The 4th XI won the South Eastern Trophy 5C.

The men's hockey side won the South Eastern 3B, being defeated on only one occasion in the eight games that they played. In the Plate competition they beat Royal Free and University College Medics 10-1 at the semi-final stage, and won the final against Edge Hill by an impressive 10-4 scoreline.

The cricket season started with the men's 1st XI losing in a tight game by two wickets to Cardiff followed by wins against Southampton, Bristol, Reading and Warwick. The men's 1st XI won the Premier League South B but lost the play-off against Bradford/Leeds UCCE. James Keightley, James Kingstone, Andrew Mawson and Andrew Ward all played for English Universities. The women's 1st X1 had another successful season, making the Indoor finals held at Trent Bridge and winning the South Eastern 1A. Their season culminated in the Shield semifinal against Leeds, which they narrowly lost by one run.

This year has also seen a number of memorable individual performances. Ben Brown was selected as a member of the gymnastics team that competed at the XXII World University Games, held in Daegu, Republic of Korea in August 2003. Also at the BUSA Championship for fencing Julia Day and Claire Holloway finished 2nd and 3rd respectively in the foil and epee competitions.

St Mary's athletes continue to demonstrate a high level of performance, and the overall level of achievement is significant, especially for a college that has such relatively low student numbers. The quality partnerships that exist with UK Athletics and the English Institute for Sport have proved to be invaluable, and undoubtedly help to encourage the performance culture that exists. Anyone who visits the modernised strength and conditioning area is likely to see a world-class athlete, such as Kelly Holmes, training alongside current students. This environment is a mark of the progress that has been made and can only be advantageous for our own student performers. With the new synthetic floodlit track due to be completed in August 2004 the future looks even more promising.

Strawberry Hill Overseas Concern

For those of you new to the Simmarian, SHOC is the college charity established to support the work of Simmarians working in Africa, Asia and Latin and Central America. Since its foundation in 1970, SHOC has raised more than £100000 for more than 100 schemes. We limit our work to projects that have a direct Simmarian connection and we provide one-off or long term financial and other assistance. There are no costs involved and all money raised goes to our Simmarian links overseas.

During the past year we have continued to support projects in Ghana, (£1500 for Wa Secondary School), Kenya (£750 towards a nursery school at Marigat), Nigeria (£250 towards Vincentian schools in Amakom), Sierra Leone (£500 towards war and famine relief at Bo), Tanzania (£250 towards library facilities at Singida) and Uganda (£250 towards schools in Gulu). We have also maintained our contacts with Sister Mary Anne Katiti in Kabwe, Zambia.

Our major efforts this past year, however, have been focused on one project, the construction of Sister Dee Smith's HIV/ AIDS hospice in Guatemala (more details appear in the following article). With the help of parishioners from St Margaret's, college staff and students, over £20000 has been raised towards her hospice dream. The parishioners chose the project as one of their Lenten charities and a member of college staff, Dermot Kelly (Management and Business Enterprise), kindly agreed to be sponsored when he ran in the London Marathon.

The latest news of the hospice is that the boundary wall around the donated land is complete and work will start shortly on the hospice itself. Partly in honour of the college's part in the project and also in honour of the devotion to Our Lady throughout Guatemala, Dee has decided to name the hospice 'St Mary's'. It is hoped that the St Mary's Hospice will be opened later this year or early in 2005.

The work of SHOC continues and we are most grateful to all Simmarians who continue to support us. One of the best and easiest ways of doing this is through the 'Give as you Eam' scheme. You simply designate SHOC as one of your chosen charities and the amount you give is deducted before tax from your salary. Proyecto Vida (Project Life)

Dee Smith was a student at St Mary's College, Strawberry Hill from 1973-1976 and has maintained strong links with the college since her graduation. After several years teaching in west Kenya, Dee was appointed by Action Aid in the early 1980s to be their Field Officer with responsibility for a major education project for nomadic Pokot children in the Kerio valley. SHOC has supported her work since the 1970s and is pleased to be associated with the Project Life Hospice Appeal.

Dee's first posting as a Maryknoll Sister was to Guatemala where she joined a small team of health workers and sisters. Shortly after her arrival, she started Project Life. Today the Project Life team consists of two overseas sisters and 14 Guatemalans.

Project Life runs four HIV/AIDS linked programmes which provide:

- Information and education relating to the prevention of HIV/AIDS
- Health services for people living with HIV/AIDS
- Laboratory testing for HIV with pre and post counselling
- Psychological and social provision for those living with HIV/AIDS.

Since its opening. Project Life has dealt with over 1000 people, 60% of whom have been males. Currently it is treating 23 children under the age of five who are living with HIV. Of the remainder, 90% are between the ages of 15 and 44 years. Most of the people who

visit the clinic are from the local Coatepeque area and the surrounding four coastal districts but some travel from the neighbouring state of San Marcos.

The distribution of HIV/ AIDS within Guatemala, as in many countries, coincides with the commercial and migratory

routes through the country. Coatepeque and Project Life are located at the epicentre of the infection and are in an almost ideal situation to meet local and wider needs.

Project Life has recently received a donation of two acres of land and hopes to build a hospice for those individuals who have nowhere to go when they are terminally ill. These people include young women trapped in prostitution, individuals whose families have rejected them and people from other countries who are too sick to travel home.

The amount required to finance this initiative is £50,000. The UK arm of the fund raising is being co-ordinated by Kevin Cook. Other funding sources include Ireland, the USA and those within Guatemala itself. For further information about Project Life please contact Kevin at St Mary's.

Chaplaincy Report

The Chaplaincy team are extremely pleased with the number of students involving themselves in the many groups and activities which we facilitate and organise throughout the academic year. We are committed to creating a welcoming and caring community which is continually reaching out to others. Students are encouraged to develop their skills and talents creatively, in serving each other and the wider needs of our world, and our hope is that in the years which lie ahead students may go on to assume active roles within the Church and society.

This year the Chaplaincy has once again been successful in raising money for local and national children's charities. Our annual Carol Singing Appeal in London raised $\pounds5900$, the Lenten Appeal for St John Bosco's Teacher Training College in Ghana raised $\pounds1850$, and the Simms Lourdes Group raised $\pounds2440$ which was used to send children with learning



disabilities to Lourdes at Easter, and to subsidise student fares. With the help of former students we organised a fundraising evening in the college bar and we raised the magnificent sum of $\pounds1610$. We would like to thank everyone for their generous support.

This year we have created new opportunities for students to work as volunteers in the local community and beyond. We have students involved at Feltham Young Offenders Institution, gaining experience working with Radio Feltham, small faith sharing groups and sporting activities; The Soho Family Centre, which provides community services for those who live and work in the diverse community of Soho with differing needs; The Shooting Stars Trust, which is building a hospice for children in Hampton; The Lord Clyde Nightshelter which provides accommodation for the homeless, and CARA which helps women and children infected or affected with HIV/AIDS.

Many students are involved in the organisation of college liturgies and we encourage all students to become more involved in fellowship and educational opportunities. Students have organised Taize styled prayer evenings and facilitated the 'At Your Word, Lord' Renewal Programme. We also shared together in a successful Lenten Retreat at Cumberland Lodge and the Christian Union hosted a Mission Week at St Mary's and collected money for charity. Another Successful Year for St Mary's

St Mary's continues to grow and to adapt to the demands from potential undergraduate students. Foundations for the Future

Foundation degrees are opening up opportunities for people who are working to gain access to higher education and St Mary's is fully committed to this initiative. A new Foundation Degree in Sport and Health and Fitness began in February 2004 in conjunction with Richmond College. This programme is aimed at students who work or want to work in one of the many areas of sport health and fitness and combine academic study with vocational experience. The Foundation Degree in Child and Youth Studies (formally Children and Young People Learning) is now well established and has led to the development of a part-time third year programme that will enable students who have completed the foundation degree to obtain a BA (Honours) in Education in Context (Classroom Support) which will begin in September 2004. This third year is also open to students who have completed a suitable foundation degree or HND at other institutions. A further two foundation degrees are due to start in September 2004; Foundation Degree in Education in Context (Administration) which will provide people currently working in education administration with the opportunity to gain a relevant vocational foundation degree by part time study and a Foundation Degree in Health Care Chaplaincy for those working as Chaplains in hospitals or other care settings. This programme is the first of its kind in the country and is a joint venture between the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches.

This has been the Gibraltar Simmarian Society's ninth successful year since its birth in 1995. It has continued to provide advice and information to prospective simmarians in Gibraltar who approach members every year seeking a more detailed or first-hand evaluation of the college, its courses, its social life and the surrounding area. 2004 is also seeing the tercentenary celebrations of a British Gibraltar.
