# Honorary Fellows

Cister Dee Smith, Andy Sutch, Barry Keates CBE, KSG and Bishop Malone are the latest recipients of Honorary Fellowships from St Mary's College.

Sister Dee Smith, a former student of St Mary's, is responsible for Proyecto Vida (Project Life) which provides education in the prevention of AIDS as well as diagnostic and community services for people living with HIV.

During the past twelve years, the project has grown from a staff of two to its current twenty-one full time staff. Nine additional staff have been contracted to work at the St Marys hospice at Coatepeque, opened in August 2005. This is a centre for the incurably sick and its construction was supported by St Mary's and by local and national parishes.

As well as co-ordinating the work of Proyecto Vida, Sr Dee has recently been

elected President of the National AIDS Coalition of Guatemala and of the country's Co-ordinating Mechanism for the Global Fund for AIDS.

Andy Sutch is a highly respected figure in British sport. He contributed to the emergence of Lottery funding in sport and oversaw the investment of more than £100 million in London's sport. He has also made a significant contribution to sport in the Borough of Richmond upon Thames.

Andy's contributions to national sport include the modernisation of the Rugby Football Union and the RFU for Women. He acts as advisor to bodies including the Sports Aid foundation and the Government Sports Sponsorship Service. Most recently he contributed to London's bid to stage the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Andy advised St Mary's on two Lottery bids, the second of which was successful - helping to build the running track, re-

furbish the changing rooms and bring the English Institute of Sport to the campus. Andy now has an active retirement working in the sport and leisure industry.

Barry Keates CBE MA (Oxon) KSG became a governor of St Mary's in 1999 and was Vice-Chairman of the Board between 2000 and 2005. As Vice-Chairman of the Board, with an extensive business background in personnel management, Barry Keates was enormously influential in the development of the College.

Barry Keates was awarded the CBE in 1994 for 'services to industrial relations'. In 2005 he received the Papal Knighthood of St Gregory. In 2006 he will receive the honorary degree of Master of the University of the University of Surrey.

The Right Reverend Vincent Malone, Auxiliary Bishop in Liverpool since 1989, has a wide experience of education in schools as a teacher and in higher education as Chaplain to both the Notre Dame College, Liverpool and Liverpool University.

Bishop Malone chaired the Higher Education Committee of the Bishops' Conference and, until 2005, the Joint Advisory Committee for Church Colleges (JACCC), a statutory committee of the Higher Education Funding Council and the Training and Development Agency for Schools. He has earned enormous respect from funding councils and from the heads of Church colleges and universities for his gently assertive chairmanship of the JACCC and for his profound interest in the Church college sector.

Honorary Fellowships are conferred on people eminent in their chosen field who have made an outstanding contribution to society. The new Honorary Fellows were presented to the Chairman of the Board of Governors, Right Reverend Bishop George Stack, on Friday February 17.

nce again I am pleased to introduce the latest edition of the Simmarian and report briefly on developments under way or in prospect. If and when you are able to visit the campus you will see that we are continuing to develop our facilities. A new 200-seat college café will open in June

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## De Paul Prize Awarded

On November 7, 2005 the programme of Theology and Religious Studies awarded the de Paul Prize to former students Judy Corry and Michaela Mitchell. The prize is given for the best dissertation in the year and the prize was shared between two pieces of work.

Judy Corry wrote a dissertation entitled Who is Judith? What is She? A critical exploration of the range and diversity of the interpretation of her icon. This explored attitudes to the character of Judith in traditional Christian theology, recent feminist work and by some artists. Judy is now studying for an MA in Religion and Conflict at St Mary's. Michaela Mitchell wrote about *The Word* becomes Flesh' A critical evaluation of the concept of revelation in Dei Verbum. Michaela is now studying for an MA in Pastoral Theology. The prize, a book token, is named the de Paul Prize in memory of St Vincent de Paul.

Dr Lynne Scholefield, the Programme Director in Theology and Religious Studies, awarded the prize. She said, "the two winners are to be congratulated on their outstanding work". Other staff and current students in the programme were present to celebrate the occasion.

# Visit of High Commissioner

The High Commissioner for Grenada, His Excellency Mr Joseph S Charter, visited St Mary's last December. His Excellency met staff and students who subsequently visited Grenada on a combined Geography and Tourism field visit in February.

A party of twenty-three third year students and tutors spent eight days on the island to carry out small research projects.

The projects ranged from examining the influences of Grenada's colonial past on its current tourism product to the island's responses to global sustainable tourism initiatives. One group critically examined the concept of the eco-friendly hotel while another investigated the cultural geography of Grenada's minibuses with their highly personalised messages.

The appropriateness and effectiveness of the management strategies for Grenada's

coasts, the impact of the two hurricanes on the geography of the island and the relationships between the ex-patriot communities on the local community were also examined.

Dr Kevin Cook, the Director of Geography at St Mary's said, "I am most grateful to all the staff and students who made this field course such a positive and productive experience".

Mr Charter was invited to St Mary's by Ms Sally-Ann Richards, a tutor in Tourism and herself a Grenadian. In September 2004 Grenada was hit by Hurricane Ivan, the first hurricane to strike the island in 50 years. Ivan caused extensive damage to the island's infrastructure, agriculture and tourism industry, and the £900 raised by staff and students will have contributed, in a small way, to the island's reconstruction and recovery.



# Conference News

Two history lecturers at St Mary's attended high-profile international conferences in 2005. Dr Claire Norton travelled to Istanbul to speak at the Ottoman and Atlantic Empires in the Early Modern World conference. She addressed the conference on the subject of *The diplomatic sub-texts of two Ottoman 'victory letters' sent to Queen Elizabeth I, after the conquest of Nagykanizsa castle in 1600.* Dr Norton's participation in the conference is part of St Mary's continuing exploration of Muslim-Christian relations in the wider Mediterranean world.

Dr Glenn Richardson, Director of History, visited the United States to conduct a short lecture tour. He addressed the North American Society for Court Studies at Loyola University, Chicago, on the subject of *Gift-Exchange and Anglo-French relations in the reign of Henry VIII*, focusing on an important aspect of Renaissance diplomacy.

Dr Richardson then travelled to the Sixteenth Century Society of America's annual conference in Atlanta, Georgia, at which he was a member of a panel of British and American historians discussing history and the cinema. He spoke on the film *Anne of the Thousand Days*, making comparisons between the way Anne Boleyn was portrayed in the film and the views of professional historians.

Dr Parvaneh Tavakoli of the School of CCCA attended the TELLSI (Teaching English Language and Literature Society of Iran) conference in February to give a plenary talk. The conference was held at Razi University, in Kermanshah, Iran. Dr Tavakoli spoke about a research project she is conducting with Dr Pauline Foster, also of CCCA. The project is investigating task based language learning.

Stuart Oliver, a lecturer in Geography, was invited to attend a workshop in Rome in December 2005 to advise the United Nations. The workshop was organised by the International Geographical Union (the international body representing Geography) to advise the UN on the geographical issues involved in the proclamation of an 'international year on cultures and civilizations'.

### NEWS SNIPPETS

#### BBC returns to Walpole House

The BBC visited Walpole House to film an interview with John Mullan, a professor of English and literary critic. Walpole had a vision of a ghostly hand appearing in the dimly lit main staircase of the house which inspired his novel, *The Castle of Otranto*.

The Castle of Otranto, the first gothic horror novel, was discussed in the programme which aims to tell the 'story of the ghost story'. The programme examined the origins of the genre and discussed its main writers. The Story of the Ghost Story was screened in December.

#### Roy Hattersley at St Mary's

Roy Hattersley visited St Mary's in January for a tour of Walpole House. Lord Hattersley, a former Cabinet Minister and former Deputy Leader of the Labour Party, is a prolific writer and has written for most of the national newspapers. He discussed his visit in his column in the Daily Mail, published on January 31, 2006.

### A Message from the Executive Committee of the Simmarian Association

At the AGM of the association last September it was decided that we Aneeded to look at where the Association was going. We had a series of committee meetings to look at this. We realised that we had to change, and looked at how we might do this. We know that it is very important that we bring with us the present students; indeed, we already have the SU President on our committee. We also must reach out to the very recent past students as these are our life blood.

The College has a first class Marketing Department and Alumni Office and we would see ourselves working alongside them. The intended proposal to be put at the AGM of the Association is that the Executive Committee should stand down. It is further to be recommended that the College consider how the concerns of the Simmarian Association might be assimilated within its own remit.

Some other possibilities might also be considered. This is all intended to achieve benefit of gain. An unnecessary duplication of function would be removed and key tasks would be professionally serviced. Outreach to the regional associations would be better provided. The autonomy of the regional associations is not at issue and their vitality would continue at local level. If the proposal is accepted it may be necessary to revise the Constitution of the Association.

In all such matters the approval of Simmarians is paramount. The Simmarian Association is better known to those of us of a certain vintage. How the years have passed! Our experience of college was that of a smaller community with a singular focus on teacher training. Past students were regarded as members of the Association. Some may even have been enticed to part with a joining fee! Many engage with their regional associations. A goodly number would gather at Easter and reside in college for the period of the Easter Tridium. It was a time for Liturgical Reunion and was also an occasion to celebrate our Silver and Golden Jubilarians. The AGM on Holy Saturday received reports, elected officers and dispersed contributions to worthy causes. The Simmarian Newsletter was the link to members on all matters Simmarian. A golden age perhaps!

During the intervening years the College has grown in scale and diversity. The context seems forever changing. Responding to so great a number of students - past, present and future - is especially challenging. Today's economies of scale are of a different magnitude. The College created an Alumni Office to provide a range of services to former students and that agenda has grown considerably. The magazine resides in that domain and its production costs are considerable.

Occasional mailings from other agencies in College remind us of thrusts to give leadership and to invite supports for development and charitable projects. That agenda is writ large. It is all an expression of an impressive response to a greatly expanded and expanding scale of enterprise. It is in such a creative context that the Executive Committee of the Simmarian Association wishes to recommend acceptance of a willingness to revise the current structure and become more decidedly part of the new and developing initiatives in College. That decision is ours alone and is of our own prompting and is, in our opinion, to the greater good of the Simmarian Association.

# Outstanding results for St Mary's athletes

The rugby league squad started the year off in impressive style playing in the 2006 Powergen Challenge Cup, the league's most historic and prestigious tournament. The side were the only student club eligible to play in the competition as winners of the BUSA Championship and put in an extremely creditable performance losing 40-20 away to Castleford Panthers. The Panthers were at the top of the National Conference League Division Two and the St Mary's team performed admirably in a challenging and competitive encounter.

As winners of the 2005 Student Rugby League Championship this year's side made an extremely creditable attempt to retain the title. The team finished 2nd in the National League with an incredible 323 positive points difference, by far the biggest in the league. With a win against Leeds University in the early part of the knockout the team played Leeds Metropolitan at the semi-finals stage and lost 44-10.

At the World University Games in Izmir, students from St. Mary's competed as part of the Great Britain squad. Andy Baddely won silver in the 1500m final and Darren Chin a bronze as a member of the 4x100m. Nicola Sanders followed up her bronze in the 4x400m at the IAAF World Championships in Helsinki, coming 6th in the 400m hurdles final, and Andy Frost competed in the hammer. Ben Brown, who attended the previous World University Games in Beijing, was once again a member of the gymnastics squad.

Later on in the year the country squad looked fend its BUSA Champiin Stirling. Despite a number of performers being unavailable d u e

c r o s s to deonship to injury the squad made every effort and performed well to achieve overall 3rd position. St Mary's proved their strength in depth with notable individual performances from Andy Vernon, Matt Ashton, Keith Gerrard, Mark Draper, Laura O'Dell and Vicky Calloway who all finished highly placed in their respective long races. In the BUSA Outdoors Championships the squad performed well, the men finishing in 3rd position behind Loughborough and UWIC, with a number of strong individual performances. A number of the St. Mary's teams have performed well in the 2006 BUSA leagues. The women's rugby union won the 2nd division winning all six of their games and qualifying for the Shield Championship where they eventually lost to Essex University in the quarter finals. The netball side won the 1st division but narrowly lost to the University of Gloucester 45-49 in the Premier League play-off and to Bath in the Championship. The women's basketball team made the finals of the Shield but lost to the home side, Sheffield University, 50-71.

The men's football 1st XI beat both Exeter University and Bath University in the early stages of the Trophy Championship but lost 6-1 to UWE Hartpury in the final. The men's football 4th XI won their division but lost to Roehampton University in the 1st round of the Plate. Lastly, the women's hockey team,

on regaining promotion to the Premier League, had a good season with wins against Cambridge and Bath and finished in a solid mid-table position.

### World Class Sport St Mary's

As mentioned in the Principal's letter, former St Mary's student Shelley Rudman provided the highlight of the 2006 Winter Olympics winning a silver medal in the women's Olympic skeleton. A recent Sport Science graduate, Shelley had already had an excellent year having previously won silver in the European Championship. Shelley finished 1.23 seconds behind Maya Pedersen, the pre-competition favourite and Swiss champion, and attained speeds in excess of 75mph whilst hurtling down the track head first and face down balancing on a composite sled.

Another Simmarian Rebecca Romero added to her Olympic achievements by winning gold in the women's quadruple skull at the World Rowing Championships in Japan.

St Mary's had fourteen current or recently graduated students competing at the 2006 Melbourne Commonwealth Games. Simon Amor and Nils Mordt gained silver medals as a part of the England rugby 7s squad, with Amor the captain and current IRB 7s player of the year. Gary Peacham, James Sullivan, Wayne Parillon, George Coogan and Steve Owen all played for their respective nations in the Student Rugby League Home Nations Tournament with Peacham and Sullivan going on to gain selection for the GB student rugby league squad.

# Sport St Mary's in the Community

Cport St Mary's worked in partnership with the London Borough of Richmond upon Thames to host the first Girls Only Competitive Edge Rugby Festival. The event was a major success with twelve primary schools competing for the under-11 title and nine secondary schools playing in the under-13 age group. Over two hundred female rugby players participated and Chase Bridge and Waldegrave were the eventual winners in the respective age groups. The day was supported by the Rugby Football Union, the England Women's Rugby Team, Harlequins Rugby League and London Irish RFC. Competitive Edge is an excellent initiative that is realising its primary aim of encouraging young people to play sport.

The start of the new rugby league season saw Harlequins Rugby League, formerly the London Broncos, playing locally at the Twickenham Stoop. Sport St Mary's and Harlequins have formed an exciting partnership aimed at fulfilling both performance and community objectives. The St Mary's rugby league side certainly benefited from the expert coaching from Phil Jones, the Harlequins' Performance Manager. A number of Harlequins Academy players are studying at St Mary's and have gained a scholar-

ship, and some of the St Mary's team are now playing for the Academy side. St Mary's rugby league players are involved in community initiatives developed by Harlequins, mostly involving coaching in local schools and at tournaments.

## Flora London Marathon

Dr Richard Fisher, Vice Principal, said, "We are delighted that so many members of staff participated in the London Marathon and helped to raised so much money for their selected charities. We have a close affiliation with the marathon as Dave Bedford, the Race Director, is a former student of the College."

## Endorsement for the Sports Science Programme

The Sports Science programme at St Mary's has been endorsed by BASES (British Association of Sport and Exercise Sciences). This endorsement requires academic programmes to meet a number of criteria including the range and balance of disciplines associated with sports science, as well as criteria related to laboratories, student laboratory work and the number of BASES accredited staff.

Undergraduate students on the programme study a wide range of sporting disciplines related to understanding and improving performance including Environmental Physiology, Performance Analysis Science of Strength Training, Sport and the Media, and Sport Psychology. The programme also includes practical work exploring the nature, implementation and evaluation of training programmes in a chosen sport or activity.

Vice-Principal Dr Mary Eaton said, "St Mary's is one of the first institutions in the country to receive this endorsement and it is a positive recognition of the strength of our work in this area."

# The Grotto Club

Do you have any memories of London's Grotto Club? Roddy Beare told *The Simmarian* about it.

'The club was started in 1958 in a cellar in Baker Street. The club was founded by four Simmarians - Alan and Des Scanlon, Tony Stear and the late John Junkin. It was for young, professional Catholic people. It was quite small and had a little bar. On weekends it had a dance on Friday, Saturday and Sunday to a four piece band. It would get very crowded and the atmosphere was just wonderful.

During the week there would be various activities ranging from a folk club which was always very full to a chess club, debating society and so on. Away from the club there would be car rallies, badminton, rambles, skiing holidays and many more activities. It was a wonderful place to meet, and heaven knows how many couples had tied the knot having met at the club.

The club lasted for seven years in Baker Street, but eventually it was decided to find a larger place, so in 1966 a new club was started called The Cardinal Club, just off Regent Street, again in a cellar. The new club was much bigger than the old Grotto Club, but most of the activities were about the same. This club lasted for seven more years and closed in 1973.'

# St Mary's and the Second World War

Work at St Mary's continued throughout the Second World

War although College was closed in autumn 1940 due to the continuous air raids over London. At the start of the war, College was 'blacked out'; black out curtains were hung in every room and the windows were painted blue. Air raid shelters were constructed to accommodate two hundred and fifty people. A Home Guard Unit was formed at the College and a team of over fifty fire fighters,

call up papers arrived so I reported to the local enlistment offices and was sworn in. Then, along with 30 of 40 others. I marched down to the railway station very proudly. Suddenly, I heard a voice shout 'RILEY'. I sprang forward and he said; 'You are NOT going on the draft, you are unfit for military service, go home.' I slunk away, all three feet

supported by 'spotters', was formed to protect the house. There was also a 'Blackout Nark' who inspected adherence to black out procedures. A squadron of the London University Air Force was based at College to give voluntary pre-service training to its members.

The age of admission to the College was reduced to seventeen to enable students to complete some training before being called to service. Many students and members of staff volunteered for active service. A special newsletter was distributed to Simmarian servicemen to keep them updated on College news.

I spent the following fifteen months doing war work, building air raid shelters, working in an MOD munitions factory, refusing a teaching job at the local college, having an operation and finally, being accepted into the army in January 1941.

In November 1940, St Mary's was severely damaged in an air raid. Whilst there were no casualties, substantial portions of the 1920s and 30s build-

During September we intend to conduct interviews for research purposes, and to record them on tape for possible access to visitors to Strawberry Hill House, once its renovation is complete. ings were burnt out and a bomb came through the roof of the Long Gallery and damaged the inlaid wooden floor below. The former Chapel was also damaged in raids during the summer of 1944.

In the newsletter produced by the 1944 to 1946 group, Des McMahon recalls his first night at College during which the new students were sleeping in the underground air raid shelters. coke-fired braziers had been placed in the shelters to warm them, but at Mass the following morning sixteen of these students fainted due to carbon monoxide poisoning from the braziers.

A Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving was held on Sunday May 13 following the end of the War. In 1947 a large number of ex-servicemen came to St Mary's and many college rules were relaxed due to the maturity and experience of these students.

A total of seventy-five Simmarians were killed on duty and the 1945 edition of the Simmarian stated, 'we are proud of the men who have set such a fine example for us to follow, so let us not forget in our prayers the souls of those who will never return.'

### **From the Archives**

In the 1961 edition of the Simmarian, students were invited to have their hair cut at Tony Manzi's salon which was staffed with a team of 'First Class Artistes'. Tony Manzi was the personal hairdresser to Max Bygraves, Eric Sykes and a 'host of stars' and specialised in 'immaculate' hairdressing and not 'the quick five minute careless haircut'. All services were offered at a discounted price of five shillings to staff and students of the College.

Other advertisers in the magazine included the Waldegrave Arms, 'everyone comes to the Waldy, why don't you?', Albert's music shop 'specialists in accordions' and Len Smith's 'where one can obtain the best school wear and sports goods'. Len Smith's and Alberts are very much in business. The Waldegrave Arms is now being rebuilt as flats.

It was a fantastic occasion and SHOC's contribution to its success was warmly noted. The last few months have been very busy here at College for SHOC. In conjunction with Fr Devlin and the Chaplaincy team, it has been decided to formalise our charitable status. study visits to the area with students on the Drama in the Community module, and the 'Kilimanjaro Project' has developed out of these contacts. By the time you read this article, we will have held an 18th century Walpole evening at Strawberry Hill to raise funds for the project.

Thus SHOC is now supporting three major projects in Guatemala, South Africa and Tanzania. We continue to support on-going projects in Sierra Leone, Ghana, Kenya and Peru

and we have taken on several smaller projects as well. We have recently sent a donation to the work of Simmarian Hannah Snowden (2000-2003) in Cambodia. Hannah is nearing the end of two very successful years working as a VSO volunteer

in the capital, Pnomn Penh. During that time she has set up a centre for some of the city's street children. The centre is providing tuition in English, numeracy and creative arts and Hannah has plans for a nutrition



centre and medical services. This is a wonderful example of the kind of charitable work that Simmarians everywhere are involved in and SHOC is delighted to be able to support Hannah's work.

We have continued our strong links with Sister Mary-Ann Katiti in Zambia. Sister Mary-Ann is headmistress of the Angelina Tembo Girls Secondary school in Kabwe and SHOC has helped in the past with funding for the building of classrooms. We were delighted, therefore, when Simmarian Carmel Kelly (2003-2006) volunteered to teach at the school. SHOC was able to help by agreeing to pay Carmel's air fare to Kabwe and she has now safely arrived and is well into helping the teaching and learning of English and RE in the school.

The challenge facing SHOC now is to meet all these many commitments. We cannot do so without your continued support. Thank you once again for your continued tremendous generosity.
