

What is a micro enterprise?

 Micro-enterprises (also called micro-providers) are very small companies run by their owners with few or no employees

 A micro social enterprise is an organisation that applies commercial strategies to maximise improvements in human and environmental well-being

What is a micro social enterprises?

Many micro social enterprises start as a hobby or an idea and anyone can start a micro social enterprise


An example of a micro social enterprise:

- an individual may be interested in setting up a cake making/decorating business
- The initial benefit to the community would be that they could donate a very small percentage of the cakes to the local foodbank

Micro Social-enterprises Vs Commercial enterprises

- Micro-enterprises connect with the people of their community. Making positive decisions for their customers and contributing to local community benefits
- Comparatively, large commercial enterprises are typically beholden to distant shareholders or corporate strategic matters, therefore distancing themselves from a relationship with the people in their communities

Micro Support in the Home

Jane works on her own, providing help in the home to 14 people in her local area. The support she provides is very flexible, from preparing food to taking people to the doctors or to concerts



Small Steps

- Small Steps is a micro-enterprise employing three members of staff and providing a community-based day service for older people
- Activities includes physical activities, days out, social and peer group activities



Supporting Diverse Communities

A football club, set up and run by someone with learning disabilities. The club owner saw the need for the service because of his own negative experiences of other football groups that excluded people with disabilities
