Working in the position I have for HEPP has really allowed me to utilise many of the skills I learnt and developed as a Student Ambassador. I worked as a regular ambassador in my first year, then progressed onto the roles of WP and later Senior Ambassador in my second and third years.



The type of students that HEPP works with are typically from a WP background, and my work as a WP ambassador really allowed me to gain a much better understanding of the sorts of issues and potential barriers that students from this background face; which has allowed me to excel in my current role. My time as a Student ambassador allowed me to grow in confidence, and offered me so many different working opportunities. One event that stands out the most, is an open event I attended to promote the university, at an all girls boarding school; I was asked by the recruitment to chat to potential students at the school and during this time I was approached by the head of the school, and here I am working at that exact school 15 months on!



Since leaving St Mary's I have been working as a Graduate Assistant at Mayfield Girls School. I am a core member of the boarding staff team for the sixth form student house - I work alongside two staff members, supporting the girls academically and pastorally. During the school days, I have 1/2 teaching timetable teaching Psychology and PE, and working in the school office.
