Meet a FETTA Student. This month we talked to Joseph Masterson, final year student from BA Education Studies and Theology, Religion and Ethics



Tell us a bit about yourself and why you chose to study at St Mary's

I was really unsure what to study, but I was really interested in Theology, Philosophy and Ethics and one of my sixth form teachers suggested St Mary's. I went to an open day and met the teaching staff and thought this would be a good place for me in terms of both my personal and academic growth. I decided on a joint honours programme with Education Studies and Theology, Religion and Ethics

Is there a particular staff member you would like to give a shout out too, who particularly inspired or supported you?

I was taught Religion in Contemporary Society by Stephen Bullivant and he was amazing. We did loads of really interesting field trips like the Thai Buddhist temple in Wimbledon, the Jewish Museum in Camden. We have kept in touch; he has guided my personal reading and both Stephen and Jacob Phillips were absolutely fantastic in supporting my dissertation. The third person I'd like to give a shout out to is Bob Hope.

What is your proudest or most memorable moment at St Mary's?

One of my most memorable, was turning up to my first Theology class and half the class were seminarians and thinking I must be in the wrong room. Some of the guys were only 5 or 6 years older than me and I thought whoa! It's been an incredible eye-opening experience to talk and work with them you know, finding out what they did before and how they got to this point in their lives, having arrived at the decision to dedicate their lives to God.

One thing that I'm really proud of is that I took part in the Commuter Mentor Scheme this year, along with 8 others. We had a group of about 38 first year students who joined. Through regular meet-ups, we were able to show them the ropes and support them to settle in. My proudest moment though, is that I have been President of the Catholic Society this year. The membership has more than doubled, we've had a great committee and put on loads of events. The Eucharistic procession in February was really successful in raising our profile and spreading the Gospel.

Tell us about something you do outside of university.

I rap, I love a rap battle and I play guitar and piano. I was in a band for 5 years and we did a whole load of different things, including some charity fundraisers at arrivals in Luton Airport. Yeah, it was probably a bit baffling for some of the tourists, we got some funny reactions. We'd end up with a bucket of all sorts of currencies, we'd take literally anything and then we'd go round to the currency exchange desk to change it up before we left. I imagine they were thrilled to see us coming!

What are your plans for the summer?

Catch up on sleep, but also on a variety of people who I've been meaning to see. I'm also off to Silverstone to see the British Grand Prix in July, which is a $21^{\rm st}$ birthday present from my amazing family.

What do you want to do in the future?

I've been accepted onto PGCE Secondary RE here, so I'll be back!



Meet a FETTA Colleague This month we talked to Susan Elderfield from the School of Education, Lecturer in School Chaplaincy and Youth Ministry



Tell us a bit about yourself and how you came to be Lecturer at St Mary's

I am the advisor for chaplaincy for the Archdiocese of Southwark and I found that many people who go into chaplaincy do so with very little training. I decided to approach St Mary's to see if we could put a programme in place to support them. The result was the launch, two years ago, of the Apprenticeship in Working with Children, Young People and Families (School Chaplaincy and Youth Ministry), which brings together all the elements of training you would want a person in one of these roles to have. It includes ethical and policy knowledge, quidance around mental health issues, disability etc. and the aim is to equip students so that they feel more confident in their skills and knowledge to act as chaplains and youth workers in their environment. COVID has heightened the need for skilled support of children with complex needs and even those who just need a friendly ear. So, the first cohort are about to complete the course, which is really exciting. What has been unexpectedly brilliant is that the students have formed their own community and they share resources and support each other which is just lovely to see. The collaboration of the University with the Diocese, particularly around funding, has been a real success and the hope is that this model might now spread to other diocese.

Who inspires you?

I'm an Ursuline High School old girl and our motto was 'to serve' as inspired by the teachings of St Angela Merici who founded the Ursuline Order and that is what I feel I have done for my whole life. That's been my inspiration.

If you could have another job for a day, what would you do? I'd open a retreat house in Mid France and I would look after families who needed a bit of respite. I'd have activities for the children and I'd cook French food for them.

Do you have a secret talent?

I play bass guitar, no band at the moment, but there was a band in my university days. Now there's just me, sitting in the background at home, playing the bass!





175th Anniversary Project



This project investigates the history of St Mary's University which, in 2025, is celebrating its 175th anniversary.

The project aims to share the unique history of this institution with a wide audience. Archival research is being undertaken and the team are also conducting oral history interviews with past staff and students, while engaging current students with the University's history. The research will contribute to the anniversary heritage initiatives in 2025, including a pop-up exhibition.

The project is jointly funded jointly by CERRL and UKRI. It initially runs between February and July 2024, but is actively seeking extension funding to expand activities into St Mary's anniversary year.
