This month we talked to Mahendra Desai, who is studying PGCE Secondary Science (Physics) with QTS



Tell us a bit about yourself and why you chose to study at St Mary's

I had been teaching children Physics in India for 8 years, and my students had been securing places in really prestigious medical and engineering institutions, but I thought it was a good time to reexamine my own practice. I started to look at how the Physics curriculum in the UK is more practical based and I thought there was much to learn by doing a PGCE here. I found St Mary's on Google! I knew I wanted to be near London because it's such a vibrant city, I could see the University had a great reputation and everyone I contacted was helpful and friendly, so I took a leap of faith.

How are you finding being an overseas student here?

It's my first time in the UK, so there is a lot to get used to, but I like the challenges and I am loving it here actually. My department really looks after overseas students. Jim Moreland is great also Rob Campbell, always talking to us and checking in, it's a really supportive environment.

Is there a particular staff member you would like to give a shout out too, who particularly inspired or supported you? Yes, Sarah Batty. She's actually the Course Lead for PGCE History, so not my department at all. Right at the beginning of semester one, my first assignment was due I was with my friend Abitha Balashanmugam in the refectory and we were stressed and tense because the deadline was coming and we were really not sure how to do it. Sarah walked past, she was actually on her way home and she noticed we were worried and she stopped and asked us if she could help at all. She sat and gave us her time to help explain how to tackle it, she also gave us some resources and I really appreciate that she stayed after her working day to help.

What is your proudest or most memorable moment at St Mary's

Most memorable is teaching a practical using oobleck with a group of SEND children, such a simple experiment, but so much fun and they were so engaged with this liquid that when you hit it becomes a solid

Tell us about something you do outside of university.

I play cricket and I'm hoping to join a club in time for the summer.

What do you want to do in the future?

I'd like to stay in the UK and teach Physics at least in the short term.



Meet a FETTA Colleague
This month we talked to Lisa Panford, Senior Lecturer &
Course Lead of Languages (PGCE Secondary with QTS)



Tell us a bit about yourself and how you came to be Senior Lecturer at St Mary's

I was a teacher of languages for 15 years in secondary schools in West London and was involved in teacher development and the professional development of student teachers within the school context. I applied for a part-time lecturing role here and met Annalise Gordon and Glennis Pye. It was immediately obvious to me that under their guidance, I'd have brilliant opportunities and support to grow. I took over Course Leadership when I joined the team full time in 2021. I'm currently studying for my EdDoc at SMU and my research draws on my experiences as educator and student of languages, to highlight the complexities that People of Colour face in the language classroom.

What do you enjoy most about working here?

One of the best things is bearing witness to the development of trainee teachers' confidence over the course of the year, that's such a privilege. The other thing is that I still get to be in schools. I still identify as a teacher - my safe space is still the classroom....specifically the Year 9 classroom! They get a lot of flack as a year group for testing boundaries – but I love their burgeoning confidence, the difficult questions they sometimes ask and all of the potential and brilliance that lies ahead.

That being said I enjoy a greater sense of autonomy in my role now. So many of us at the School of Education (SoE) are grounded in our professional experiences in schools and that makes for a really collaborative and supportive environment. The development of research across the SoE, for example, the new direction of CREMCYA, makes it an exciting place to work.

You were part of the self-assessment team, whose hard work led St Mary's to achieve the Bronze Race Equality Charter Award – can you tell us about that?

Professionally and personally, this has been a really powerful experience. On a personal note, I have met colleagues across the whole University and formed deep-friendships, we have a fantastic network of support. The submission was a long and challenging process but it was important to help us to identify trends, gaps in our data and most importantly, articulate a series of action points to improve racial equity within our institution. But the submission is just the start. It's enormously encouraging that the University has made this commitment to prioritise race equity. Now the work begins!

Who inspires you?

I am drawn to the body of literature written by Black female academics (hooks, Lorde, Ahmed) whose work inspires and sustains me. I am inspired by this generation of young people – my 11 year old calls out and challenges injustices way more than I did at that age – that feels hopeful in the broader sense (not necessarily when I am trying to get him out of the house and to school on time). My sense of urgency is definitely selfishly propelled by my own children and the world we are leaving for them.

If you could have another job for a day, what would you do? Teaching (in the right conditions) is the best job in the world.

Do vou have a secret talent?

Absolutely not. Does encyclopaedic knowledge (definite hyperbole) of 00s garage and hip hop count? My 5-year-old would say I give good hugs.

PgCert in Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND)



PgCert Part-time

This course combines the study and application of practice and theory to develop the pedagogical knowledge to effectively work with learner with special educational needs and disabilities.

Why study this course?

This course is relevant to anyone involved in teaching and learning wishing to advance their knowledge, practice and pedagogy in the field of SEND. You will develop a depth of understanding of a range of SEND across all phases of compulsory education. You will be supported to apply your learning to practical situations within your own setting, using your knowledge to drive effective change in inclusive SEND provision and practice. You will be introduced to seminal and cutting-edge theory and research and consider how this links to current policy and practice. You will also be encouraged to consider wider concepts of inclusion and leadership in SEND.

Why choose St Mary's?

This programme builds on our long tradition of excellence in teacher education. The success of this course lies in bespoke delivery and the quality of teaching offered. You can study face-to-face, online or a mix of the two. This will allow you to fit your studies around your current. commitments, regardless of your location. You will work with lecturers who have a background in teaching as well as experience in research. The course is enriched by visiting experts (e.g. in sensory impairment, dyslexia, child/adolescent mental health). Your learning is also personalised through one-to-one tutorials.

Teaching methods

Modules are taught either on 3 Saturdays across a semester or in fortnightly twilight sessions. Tutorials are offered in-person or online and arranged at times to suit your work commitments.

Assessment methods

- Module 1: written assignment (5,000 words) and oral presentation
- Module 2: written assignment (6,000 words)

Career Opportunities

Students may go on apply for specific roles linked to SEND (e.g. school SENCO). The 60 credits gained from the course can be put towards a postgraduate diploma. (120 credits) or masters degree (180 credits) offered through the MA Education pathways.

Modules

- Module 1: Critical Perspectives on SEND and Inclusive Practice in Schools
- Module 2: Developing Effective and Inclusive Pedagogies for Learners with SEND



Entry requirements

You will normally be expected to possess a good honours degree (2:2 or above) from a UK university or an equivalent qualification approved by the University.

Additional requirement information Experience of working in an educational setting or a relevant professional interest is also required.

International requirements

International students should check our country-specific website pages for equivalents. If English is not your first language you will need to achieve an IELTS score of 6.5 overall with no less than 8.0 in any section.
